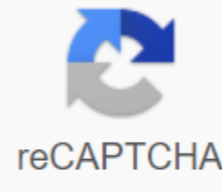

A Harvard Reference Generator is a tool that automatically generates formatted academic references in harvard style. It takes in relevant details about a source – usually critical information such as author names, article titles, publishing dates, and URLs – and adding the correct punctuation and formatting required by Harvard style. The generated references can be copied into a reference list or bibliography and then jointly added to the end of an academic assignment. Two types of quotes are included: In-text quotes are used when quoting or paraphrasing directly. They are located in the body of work and contain a fragment of the full quote. Depending on the source type, some Harvard Reference in-text quotes may seem like this: After that I lived like a young rajah in all the capitals of Europe... (Fitzgerald, 2004). Reference lists are located at the end of the work and display full quotes for sources used in the command. Each in-text quote generally displays the name of the author and the year the source was published. The in-text quote is usually located at the end of the cited or paraphrased sentence. In-Text quotes for one author The author's van and the year the source was published are placed in the brackets. Example: Gatsby's infases with Daisy are often revealed in the story, often in simple phrases like, He turned to her with a rush of emotion (Fitzgerald, 2004). If the author's name is already used in the body of the text, students must exclude it from the in-text quote. Example: Fitzgerald's use of old sports throughout the novel suggests that Gatsby is considered Nick Carraway as a close friend (2004). In-Text Quotes for Two or Three Authors When a source has two authors, both authors' names place in the order in which they appear on the source, with the word and separate them. Examples: A series of values also can print emotion. Stark, high-contrast drawings can carry a strong emotional charge (Lazzari and Schleiser, 2011). Rather than constantly seeking approval from others, try seeking approval from the person who matters most – yourself (Bardes, Shelley and Schmidt, 2011). In-Text Quotes for Four or More Authors Only use the first listed author name in the in-text quote, followed et al. and the publishing industry. Example: It can be said that knowledge of the stages of growth and development helps predict patient's response to the current disease or the threat of future illness (Potter et al., 2013). Example: Potters et al. (2013) continue to explain that among most Catholic Filipinos, parents keep the newborn in the house until after baptism to ensure the baby's health and protection. In-Text Quotes for Corporate Authors Use the name of the organization in place of the author. Example: Dr. Scharschmidt completed her stay in 2012, joined the Leaders Association in 2013 and this year became a new volunteer to encourage other young dermatologists in her area to join her in leadership conversation (Dermatology Foundation, 2014). If the name of the organization is used in the text, only place the year in brackets. Example: The Dermatology Foundation (2013) said in their report that the industry also played an important role in the success of the highly rated annual DF Clinical Symposia Progress in Dermatology. In-Text quotes for No author When an author's name cannot be found, place the title of the text in the brackets, followed by the publication year.
